VOLLEYBALL 101

A whistle-stop guide to the fast-paced and thrilling game!


- A volleyball game consists of two teams of six players each, separated by a net. Volleyball posi tions are Setter, Middle, Outside, Opposite and Libero.
- Two teams will rally or hit the ball back and forth over the net until a fault occurs.
- There is a maximum of three touches per side (a block does not count as a touch).
- The objective is to score points by sending the ball over the net, and grounding it on the opponent's side of the court.
- Volleyball matches are made up of sets, typically three or five sets. All matches at Final 4 will be played as best of five.
- Each set is played to 25 points. Sets must be won by at least two clear points. Tie break sets (fifth set) are played to 15 points.

Quick guide rules

- Only six players on the floor at any given time: three in the front row and three in the back row.
- Players may not touch the ball twice in succession (a block is not considered a hit).
- A ball may be played off the net during a volley and on a serve.
- A ball hitting a boundary line is in.
- A ball is out if it hits an antenna, the floor completely outside the court, any of the net or cables outside the antennae, the referee stand or pole, or the ceiling above a non-playable area.
- It is legal to contact the ball with any part of a player's body.
- It is illegal to catch, hold or throw the ball.
- A player concedes the point if they touch the net.
- A player cannot block or attack a serve from on or inside the three-metre line.



The University of Nottingham (UON) men's volleyball team is gearing up for an exciting new season after finishing sixth overall last year.

Although they faced a tough start, losing 3-0 to Essex in their Opening Weekend encounter, UON showcased their resilience and skill by winning four out of their last five matches, with their only defeat coming against the fourth-place finishing Malory Eagles.

This strong finish highlights the Green and Golds' potential and determination to compete for the top four spots this year.

As they prepare for the 2024-25 season, UON has made several strategic changes to their roster. They have welcomed several new players, including Sonny Casserly, Griffin Walters, Fin Bullivant, Iraj Safee, Sam Peters, and Tom Lycett, each bringing unique skills and experience to the squad.

These new additions are expected to strengthen the team's performance and contribute significantly to their campaign, but they have lost the services of Slater Bird, who was an influential component of the side last season.

A key performer is set to be Lisle Costard, noted for his calm and collected manner on court that helps bind the team together.

This Opening Weekend, UON will face off against newcomers to the league, Essex Blaze, who recently clinched the Division One title. The match-up promises to be highly-competitve, as both teams aim to establish themselves early on with a fast start.

The team's commitment to improvement and their competitive spirit will be key as they aim to rise in the standings and secure a higher finish in the league than they did in 2023-24.

Alongside the Super League, Nottingham will also seek to go one better in the BUCS Championships after finishing with a silver medal at Big BUCS Wednesday last season, losing out in the final to Durham.

The promotion of the Blaze as NVL Division 1 champions means that there are now two teams from Essex – the Rebels the others – vying to be the county's leading team at senior level.

Coached by Chris Frost and Andy Tuck, the Eastern Region club, who play their home matches at St John Payne School's Sports Hall in Chelmsford, will continue to be captained by James Bernardi.

Vice-captain Nathan French, playing for his hometown club, was the youngest member of the GB team to play in the London 2012 Olympics Games and has also played professionally in Spain, France, Germany and Israel.

He and Sonny Chaney are cited by the club as the team's standout players to watch this season due to their blend of experience and on-court chemistry "added to a wealth of knowledge that few players can match".

While the club has lost the services of Nico Gajkiewicz, who has left for Richmond, and Nathan Hall, who has joined Essex Rebels, the club has made a quintet of signings to strengthen their ranks.

In addition to Chaney, new faces include Devon Gleave, Max Norton-Steele, Erif Rahmani and Ho Tak Tank.

Although recognising it is a big step up to the Super League, the Blaze are determined to give their all as they look to consolidate their status at the higher level.

"Our goal for this season is to reach the top five teams in the league," said Frost and Tuck. "The level of competition is incredibly high, and while we have set ambitious targets, it's important to remember that this is our first season back after a few years away.

"We are fully committed to the challenge and are looking forward to the experience, both on and off the field," said coaches Frost and Tuck. "Enjoying the journey and learning from each match will be just as important as the results. Here's to a great season ahead!"

ESSEX REBELS

Essex Rebels are preparing for another strong season as they aim "to surpass the bronze medal they won last season".

Last year, the Rebels finished third in the league after triumphing in the Bronze Medal Match at the Final 4. In a dramatic showdown against Malory Eagles, they fell two sets behind before pulling off an incredible reverse sweep, battling their way back to win 3-2 and spark jubilant celebrations.

They will be hoping to repeat last year's Opening Weekend victory, when they celebrated a 3-0 victory over the University of Nottingham, as they get their new 2024-25 season underway this weekend.

Although Essex were defeated twice by Polonia in league encounters last season, suffering a 3-1 loss away and a 3-2 reverse at home, they can take heart from the fact that they did overcome their rivals 3-2 in a dramatic National Cup tie at the Essex Sports Arena.

Alex Porter's Rebels have bolstered their squad over the summer with what they hope with key new signings and are also welcoming back the 2023-24's squad.

New recruits include the Canadian Kern brothers: former professional player Jacob (6'5"), who has a wealth of experience from playing in Germany, Holland and the Czech Republic, alongside sibling Cameron (6'3").

They will be joined by fellow countryman Daven Pascal (6'6"), England Junior player Jacob Lloyd-Williams (6'6"), Oscar Curzon-Hall (6'8"), Nathan Hall, who is making the switch from Essex Blaze, and Troy Simpson, signed from Wessex.

Collectively, these additions will make the Rebels the tallest team in the league.

Those who have moved on ahead of this season are Cohen Banks, Nico Gajkiewicz, Devon Gleave and Max Norton-Steele, the latter two having switched to Essex Blaze. Additionally, Kyle Vom Steeg and William Ragland have returned to the US after a year with the Rebels.

It was a case of so near yet so far in IBB Polonia's quest to become Super League champions last season – falling at the Final 4 final hurdle in losing 3-2 to Durham Palatinates.

The team, based out of Northolt High School, did not play as many matches as some of their rivals in the early stages of last season, but once they caught up in that regard, they quietly assumed leadership of the Super League, relentlessly winning matches while those around them were beating each other.

Not until well into the new year did they lose their only regular season game of the season, and by that time their place in the Final 4 was all-but assured, as they proved to be particularly strong on the road, relative to their rivals.

IBB, however, will no longer be able to call on England international Ephraim Mills, who has left to join Danish club ASV after five successful years in London and Mihail Stoev, who was in the Errea Team of the season and statistically ranked as Super League's best server.

Polonia pick out George Ivanov as their player to watch after an excellent 2023-24 where he showed great potential. "It's exciting to see how he's growing and developing, and I think he could take his game to the next level this year," they say.

The club is also encouraged by some of the talent emerging from the Pro Volley Academy, and hopes some of those players will be pushing hard for first team involvement.

Head Coach Niski is relishing the challenge ahead in the coming months and said: "This will be another season for me with IBB Polonia London, and I am extremely happy about it.

"As with every year, our goal is to compete for the highest trophies – the National Cup and the Super League title. Of course, sports can be unpredictable, and things don't always go as planned. However, I have complete trust in this group of people I work with.

"I know they will fight for every ball, every point, and every set to achieve our common goals."







LONDON GIANTS

In just a few, short years, the London Giants have come a long way – and they aim to keep that momentum going now they have reached the Super League.

Formed as recently as 2016, the club only entered the NVL for the first time in 2019-20 season, but their progress since then has been impressive and swift.

While the men have reached the club's top flight, the women's team have the same lofty ambitions, having won promotion to Division 1 for the 2024-25 season on the back of winning all 14 Division 2 South matches to finish 13 points clear of their nearest challengers.

The men, who play out of Clapham Leisure Centre, have Simon Roscoe as their Head Coach, while Vincenzo Agrillo, who joined midway through last season, has continued in the role of captain. Though Adam Barr has left for London Aces the club has been boosted by the signing of Noah Lassandro, a former college volleyball player, who brings a wealth of experience and, the club says, a big personality to match.

Roscoe steered his side to play-off victory over then-Super League side Newcastle Staffs in April, guiding them to a 30-28, 25-15, 25-23 at the Ashcombe School.

He is relishing the challenge of taking on the country's best and insists the club will be striving to take the next step and not settle for second best.

"Following on from the success of the team's recent seasons in the NVL, we've set some high goals for the season and looked at how we can collectively achieve these with the support of the club," he said.

"The team know we have a gap to bridge to the top teams in the country, but have the belief to achieve this.

"We are not content at merely being part of the

Super League and have set ourselves the target of arriving at the Final 4 come the end of the season... we're looking forward to the new season ahead!"

One thing the club will be able to rely on is excellent - and noisy - support for their home games, as demonstrated last season.

The Giants are also looking forward to hosting the inaugural Super League Live broadcast at Crystal Palace on 24th November.

DURHAM PALATINATES


As the reigning Super League champions and National Cup holders – not to mention a brace of BUCS titles – Durham Palatinates' 2023-24 season could hardly have gone better.

And while they are well aware those twin successes in Volleyball England competitions will mean they are the team everyone wants to beat, they are quietly confident that they can mount a meaningful defence of both those crowns.

It was the National Cup win that came first at Cup Finals Weekend as the North Easterners held off a strong comeback from Malory Eagles to win 3-1.

As in previous years, there is a high turnover over players from one season to the next for Durham, as a number of scholars have moved on, but there is also an element of continuity, with five players from last year's squad returning.

They include Ace Backer, who played a pivotal role in the team's success last season as one of the Super League's top middles, Joe Linder, Joe Kobylarz, Jakub Graczyk and the experienced Max Gibbins, who now also doubles up as a coach.

Newcomers include exciting talent American talent Chey Cooper, who the Palatinates hope "will bring a new dimension" to their offence, having previously played for Fort Valley State University and George Mason University on the other side of the Atlantic.

He will be joined in the squad by fellow overseas players Jack Troy (Carnegie Mellon University and Steel City Surge), Alexei Walisser (MacEwan University), Owen Wienczkowski (Penn State and Behrend) and Andrew Boyle (UC San Diego),

English players who have joined the club this summer are Jack Baldwin, who has returned home following a spell with Solna Volleyboll Kubb in Stockholm, Sweden, and Max Horsley, who previously played for Urmston Grammar.

For Durham, as Gibbins explains, the aim for the season is clear. "We want to match what we did last year," he said.

"It will be a tough ask, as the league continues to get stronger each year, but we're looking forward to the challenge and playing some fast, exciting volleyball along the way."

The team has also bid farewell to several key players. Toby French steps away from the court to focus on family and his new role as club Chairman, while Chester Searle has moved to Stockport after qualifying as a pilot.

With a mixture of fresh young talent and experienced campaigners, Malory Eagles are looking to soar even higher this season.
